

TEACHING, ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE

Requirements

The following 60+ credits represent the courses to be completed in alignment with UW-System guidelines for associate degrees. A minimum cumulative GPA (based upon calculation of UW-Superior's Honors GPA) of 2.75 is required for admission into the Teacher Education Program at UWS.

A minimum grade of C is required for all ARTED, ENGED, HHPED, MTHED, MUSED, NSED, SSSED, and TED courses with the exception of T ED 100 Orientation to Teacher Education and T ED 200 Introduction to Education.

A minimum grade of B is required for T ED 200 Introduction to Education and a PASS is required for T ED 100 Orientation to Teacher Education. T ED 100 Orientation to Teacher Education and T ED 200 Introduction to Education should be taken concurrently and during the semester in which 40 collegiate credits will be reached.

Overall Associate Degree Requirements

- Complete a minimum of 60 credit hours (numbered 100 or above); at least 24 credits must be earned at UW-Superior.
- Earn a resident UW-Superior cumulative grade point average of 2.00.
- The last 12 credits of the degree must be earned at UW-Superior or approved UW-Superior program.
- Complete Core and Knowledge Category requirements.
- Complete the Diversity and Global Awareness requirements.
- Submit an electronic application for graduation via E-Hive.
- Degrees are not posted to transcripts with outstanding incomplete or In-Progress grades.
- Students may not use more than one catalog; students may not satisfy the University Studies requirement from one catalog, while satisfying the major requirements of another catalog.
- Degrees are posted in the term in which a graduation application is submitted for the respective degree.
- Degrees are not posted when a student has been academically suspended.

1. An additional three credits in the Natural Sciences: courses in Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Geology or Physics.

2. An additional three credits in the Social Sciences: courses in ANTH, CJUS, ECON, FNS, GEOG, GST, LSTU, POLS, PSYC, SOCI. POLS 180 or 230 is recommended.

3. Completion of TED 100 (P required), TED 200 (B required), TED 270 (C required).

4. An additional six credits from ARTED, ENGED, HHPED, MTHED, MUSED, NSED, SSED, TED. A grade of C or higher is required in education courses.
